

NE of the unique exhibits of the New York World's Fair is the "Mormon" Pavilion. Its architectural design has been acclaimed for its beauty and for its symbolism. From its facade of towering spires, topped by the gleaming golden figure of Angel Moroni on the center spire, it is reminiscent of world-famed "Mormon" Temple in Salt Lake City.

THE THEME of the "Mormon" Pavilion has been derived from ancient and modern scripture and from man's eternal yearnings. It is: "Man's Search for Happiness"—lasting happiness as distinguished from passing pleasure. To find such happiness is the aim and end of all purposeful living.

Within the walls of the pavilion, the visitor will find a variety of artistic works created by some of the great artists of America. Each artist was commissioned to do a particular work, and many of the final products may one day take their places among the great art of our time. Each exhibit in the pavilion contributes to the story the Church is endeavoring to tell through words, music, art, and the motion picture — the story of "Man's Search for Happiness." Through one of His prophets, God revealed this beautiful and eternal principle:

"Men are that they might have joy."

Some of the portrayals we see in the development of this theme are these:

DIORAMA: "Purpose of Life."

REVOLVING DISPLAY: "Tests of Christianity."

Eighteen original paintings of Bible subjects by Edward Vebell, Wilton, Conn.; reproduced in backlighted, real-life translucencies.

REVOLVING DISPLAY: "The Church Today."

Twenty-four real-life photographs by J. M. Heslop. Salt Lake City, Utah, depicting the "Mormon" way of life, including programs conducted by the Church in recreation, benevolence, education, and moral and spiritual development. Pictures and texts are reproduced

in backlighted, full-color translucencies, REVOLVING DISPLAY: "Dark Ages to Liberty and Light."

Translucencies from twelve original paintings by Harold T. (Dale) Kilbourn illustrating "dark ages" and the lives of Christian "reformers"; also latter-day "restoration" of Gospel.
